COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This is a studio class in Watercolor Painting. It is designed as an introduction to the concepts and techniques of working within this medium. Design, perspective, value study, and color theory will be discussed and employed. Different approaches to working with the medium will be explored. Examples of artwork will be studied, both in person (museum visits etc.) and during class time. Various techniques and visual styles will be studied and deconstructed. Students will create a series of paintings and one Final Project.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

At the successful conclusion of this course, students will have mastered:

- 1. The understanding of the principles employed in composition and design.
- 2. Knowledge of paint handling, color mixing, and the interaction of color.
- 3. The ability to draw from life, copy, and render images on a 2 dimensional substrate.
- 4. The ability to suggest three dimensional form by expressing tonality.
- 5. An appreciation for history of watercolor painting through lecture and gallery visits...
- 6. The ability to discuss the various techniques used in the creation of paintings.

INSTRUCTIONAL PROCEDURES

Class direction on projects as well as one on one individual development.

Require Text and Materials:

- 1. Required text: Watercolor Basics *Let's Get Started* by Jack Reid ISBN13: 978-0-89134-867-Additional printed and online articles, handouts, as assigned.
- 2. Materials: A limited palette of tube watercolors, pad of watercolor paper, and brushes, as per the attached Materials List.
- Other Resources: Art Museums such as the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Morgan Library, area galleries, as assigned. There will be one field trip to a New York area gallery/museum details TBA.
- 4. Use of Technology: Printed material, projected images, online searches.

NOTE: A minimum of 3 hours of time outside of class is required each week to practice techniques and to work on individual projects. Any problems or questions can be raised in class and addressed either as a group lesson or on an individual basis. More time spent on projects will ultimately enhance the quality of your work. Additional individual help beyond the class time is available and can be scheduled upon request.

EVALUATION:

The final class grade will be based upon:

- 1. Projects and Assignments.
- 3. The Final Project.
- 4. The midterm Project
- 5. Attendance, In Class Participation and Extra Credit Work.

Projects handed in late for any reason will be graded down for lateness by 10% for each week.
